




Hiking Safely

- Map & compass, and know how to use them
- Leave itinerary with someone and follow it
- Pay attention!
 - Look around remember your route "in"
 - Know your approximate direction
- Always bring 24 hr worth of survival gear
- Don't panic!! They will find you

Use Your Map and Compass

- Carry a map and compass always!
 - Do not rely solely on cell phones
- Know where you are on the map
- If you get off the trail, find where you think you are on the map
- Take a bearing to a road or other landmark
- Follow your bearing




Hiking Safely – Survival Gear

- Space blanket
- Knife, Rope and tarp for shelter
- Warm clothes for an overnight
 - Fleece jacket and down puff
 - Long underwear and dry socks
- Fire starting materials
- First aid: Cuts, burns, and pain relief
- Food and water (hot in winter)
- Headlamp

Bushwhacking

- Wonderful opportunity to explore new terrain
- Don't be afraid to get off the trails
- Know how to "Orienteer"
- Have a map
- Know declination: In NH = -14⁰
- Set a bearing on your compass
- Follow your bearing




Winter Clothing

- Layers they're not wrong!
 - Baselayer pants and top
 - Mid-layer: Fleece or softshell
 - Outer layer Light to Medium weight jacket
- Only synthetics polyester or nylon No cotton but wool is fine
- Stop often to add or remove layers
 - Don't want to get wet
- Gloves light weight with heavy outer glove in pack
- Pants cross country ski or heavy hiking pants
- Gaitors help keep snow out of your boots
- Microspikes









Favorite Winter Hikes New Durham to MML

- Start on Snowmobile trail on Main Street
- Follow to Brackett Road
- Follow to BRCF

- Could take trail to Lion's pride and bushwack short distance to end of S Shore Rd



Favorite Winter Hikes Route 22 Snowmobile Trail

- Hike in either direction and return










Favorite nearby hikes – Belknap Range


- The mountains behind Mt Major that no one ever hikes

- Very well marked trails (colors)




Blueberry Pasture Trail Belknap Mountains




Straightback Mountain Belknap Range




